Water Management Permit Application Received by the Water Management Program for the Merrimack River Basin

The Department of Environmental Protection will accept written comments on the Water Management permit application filed for permitting in the Merrimack River Basin under the Water Management Act (MGL 21G). Comments will be accepted until August 8, 2005. A copy of the application is available for review from 9:00 AM to 5:00 PM, Monday through Friday, at the DEP Northeast Regional Office, 5<sup>th</sup> Floor, One Winter Street, Boston, Massachusetts. Town of Merrimac, Merrimac Light and Water Department, Merrimac, Massachusetts, has applied for a Water Management Act Permit to increase its 0.36 million gallons per day registered withdrawal to up to 0.74 million gallons per day from groundwater in the Merrimack River Basin, Merrimac, Massachusetts. Two existing wellfields will provide water for public water supply purposes to the customers of the Merrimac Light and Water Department. The East Main Street Wellfield is located to the south of Lake Attitash and the Sargent Pit Wellfield is located off Bear Hill Road to the south of the Massachusetts/New Hampshire state border. The Town of Merrimac requests approval to withdraw a total amount of 255.50 million gallons per year through the year 2014.

The Massachusetts Natural Heritage Atlas, 11th edition, lists Priority Habitats of Rare Species and Estimated Habitats of Rare Wildlife and Certified Vernal Pools in the vicinity of the East Main Street Wellfield.
